INUKSHUK

Guiding you at MG2023 with safety, hope and friendship

An Inukshuk ('i-NOOK-shook) is a human-shaped arrangement of stones balanced carefully on top of each other without the benefit of cement to hold them together.

They were traditionally used by the Indigenous people of Northern Canada, Alaska and Greenland **the Inuit** — as directional markers. There are both large and small Inukshuk, all built with different shapes and sizes of rocks and stones, making each one unique.

> The word comes from two base words in the Inuit language: inuk referring to a person, and shuk meaning substitute.

These stone sculptures were important as a point of reference for navigation, as a marker for hunting grounds, to denote a food cache, and to mark sacred places.

> Everything looks the same covered in snow, so the Inukshuk were visible when the ground was covered. They could endure extreme weather and ultimately helped people survive. The skill of building an Inukshuk was passed down from one generation to the next, with each one having a specific purpose and meaning.

Historians once thought Inukshuks were relatively modern, but formations dating as far back as 2400 – 1800 B.C. can be found on Canada's Baffin Island, a site that has been a National Historic Site since 1969 and has the nickname "Arctic Stonehenge."

> An Inukshuk signifies safety, hope and friendship.

> > The Inukshuk mirrors the spirit of friendship and community that Canadians are known for around the world. Inukshuks have become a symbol of hope and friendship that transcends borders.

> > > They were the inspiration for the logo of the 2010 Winter Olympics in Vancouver, British Columbia (lower left). The Canadian Embassy in Washington, D.C., boasts a large Inukshuk.

> > > > And so — just as an Inukshuk does — the Calgary MG Car Club plans to help travellers to MG2023

navigate their way around our city and province, showcasing our truly Canadian values of friendship and community.



The Ultimate Ice Cream Run

Roundtrip 182 km / 113 mi (2½ hours . . . Plus stops!)

Calgary MG Car Club members have an exceptional affinity for ice cream, also known as "Vitamin X." We therefore had to include one longer drive to four of the best ice cream parlours in the area. The route also includes some really good scenery to enjoy between helpings of ice cream. If four ice cream stops are too much, consider singling one out for a shorter run. But, hey! There is no such thing as too much ice cream. Correct?

■ Head-Smashed-In Buffalo Jump | Secondary Highway 785, Fort MacLeod www.headsmashedin.ca

Roundtrip 330 km / 205 mi (3 hr 15 min) | CAD \$15 adult, \$13 senior

This UNESCO World Heritage Site provides insight to the Plains Buffalo culture. Here Indigenous hunters drove buffalo over a cliff and into wooden corrals below, where others butchered the kill.






'From Miracle to Menace'

A Wheel Stud Study

This session will focus on wheel stud failure and the underlying reasons for it. John will present the results of an investigation he did into a wheel loss incident experienced by a fellow MG club member, discuss the pitfalls and dangers of incorrect wheel nut tightening, and offer recommendations for the correct tightening procedures on MGs as well as on everyday cars.

ABOUT THE SPEAKER: John is a professional mechanical engineer with a background in the aerospace, power generation and oil and gas industries.

He is consulting in the field of forensic engineering, investigating failures of mechanical equipment for clients in the insurance industry and legal profession.

Since selling his first car, a 1970 Ford Escort, John has owned a variety of MGs, Triumphs and Land Rovers, and is now driving a 1997 MGF.

The Evolution of Modern MGs

ABOUT THE SPEAKERS: John Stevenson has been collecting MGs since he was a boy. His interest in modern MGs started in 1993 when he saw the new RV8 at the Scottish Motorshow, and he imported his first one from Japan in 2013. Along with MGFs and an MG TF Steptronic (automatic), RV8s and MG ZT saloons, he owns rare turbo models, a 1985 MG Montego and a 1985 MG Metro. John is a founder of the Canadian Modern MG Rover Car Club, and Post-Abingdon coordinator for the MG Car Club of Toronto.



Rich McKie bought his first MGB new in Vancouver in 1974, followed by an MGB-GT, which led to working for Wembley Motor Works. After a brief dalliance in the aircraft industry, he was hired in 1984 by MG specialists Octagon Motor Group. where he restored T-series and MGAs and maintained MGBs. He restored his own basket-case MGA twin cam and rehabilitated a barn-find MG ZB Magnette. In 2007 he bought a 1955 ZA Magnette, which he highly modified. Rich bought the first MGF in British Columbia, and then the first MGF-VVC. Now he has moved on to big modern MGs with a ZT190 saloon and a ZT-T tourer, imported from Europe. He belongs to the Canadian Modern MG Club.


















Official Rules for North American MGB Register Events

THE COURSE

- The course shall consist of a launch incline eight feet long, followed by a level run of 20 feet.
- The launch incline shall be divided into two lanes, each 18 to 24 inches wide. The incline shall be two feet high at the rearmost part and level with the course at the front edge.
- The front edge shall be mitered so as to provide a smooth transition from the incline to the run out area.
- The official starting line shall be two feet from the rear edge of the incline. A mechanized starting gate may be provided.
- The run out section of the course shall consist of two lanes, each three feet wide. The lanes shall be clearly marked.
- The finish line shall be marked 20 feet from the front edge of the launch incline.

THE CARS

- The cars shall have no power source. All motive force is provided by gravity.
- Cars shall be based on an actual rocker (valve) cover from a British automobile engine.
- Wheelbase shall be no more that 24 inches.
- The car's wheelbase must fit within the starting gate and the ramp's rear-edge.
- The car's body may hang over the front starting gate or rear edge of the ramp, but the wheels must fit within the starting area of the track.
- Wheel track shall be no more that 14 inches.
- Cars must have four wheels, each no more than six inches in diameter and all wheels must be in contact with the ground.
- A car may not jettison any type of object *onto the ramp* on its descent.

THE RACES

- As practical, awards will presented in a Junior Class (16 and under) and an Adult Class.
- Cars will be run in heats of two cars each.
- One alignment run down the course will be allowed prior to each heat.
- The cars are to be launched with their front wheels on the starting gate. The first car to have its front wheels cross the finish line is the winner of that race. If neither car makes it to the finish line, the car going the farthest in its lane wins.
- If the wheels of a car should touch the lane markers, or cross over the lane marker, the car shall be disqualified. The competing car immediately becomes the winner for that race.
- The car that wins two out of three races in that heat will be declared the winner and will advance to the next round, until all are eliminated except one car.




Their first MG was a 1975 Golden Anniversary "B" which rolled past 100,000 miles on their way to MG2002 in Texas during a "Tag-Along."

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


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NAMGBR EXECUTIVE OFFICERS



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ABOUT THE NORTH AMERICAN MGB REGISTER

he North American MGB Register was founded in December 1990 in Grand Rapids, Michigan, by a group of MG enthusiasts wanting a democratically run national club.

Some of the charter members were John Twist, the late Ken Smith, Jerome Rosenberger, Bruce Wyckoff, Keith Holdsworth and the late Dick Knudson.

The original mission statement read:

"The ultimate purpose of NAMGBR is to provide complete support to the MGB driver. This goal will be met by offering a democratic organization that is thoroughly accountable to its members. *Credibility will be enhanced through sanctioning* by the MG Car Club of England. Additionally, it hopes to be of assistance to stranded members by offering a service list and technical tips. It will also serve as a means of coordinating the events of its members and affiliated clubs. Financial statements will be available when requested."

NAMGBR holds a national convention each year hosted by a local chapter. The first one was hosted by the MG Car Club of Toronto, Canada, in 1992 and was known as MG 92. Since that time, each of the group's annual conventions have been called "MG" plus the year of the event.

Every five years since 1996, NAMGBR has held its convention in conjunction with all-MG events sponsored by the North American Council of MG Registers. The last such event was MG International Atlantic City 2021.

NAMGBR has an open Annual General Meeting each October where the officers, coordinators, and registrars present a report of the past year's


operations to members and local chapters in attendance. The AGM is generally held at the site of next year's convention and is hosted by the sponsoring chapter. It is at this meeting that members and chapter representatives have an opportunity to ask questions about operation of the club directly to the officers. It is also at this meeting that the ballots cast by the local chapters are counted for the election of officers and any proposed changes to the bylaws.

The North American MGB Register is a registered 501(c)7 not-for-profit corporation, with around 1,900 members across North America, in the U.K., the Netherlands, Germany, Australia, Israel and other parts of the world. Sub-registers have been established for the MG Midget, MGC, MG 1100/1300, MGB LE, and post-Abingdon cars, just to name a few.

There are more than 100 local chapters, with one or more being found in just about every state and province. A complete listing can be found on the NAMGBR website.


NAMGBR's bimonthly magazine *The MG Driver* is an all-color publication packed full of articles about MG events as well as information about how the keep your car on the road, and more.
